From Our Executive Director

BEYNEINU – JUST BETWEEN US

My wife already admonished me last weekend, "Remember, Pesach koshering begins soon so don't buy large amounts of 'chometz' at Costco!" (FYI.... at this writing, it's 10+ weeks away!) That's my wife, she plans ahead for Passover.

Pesach is probably my most favorite (and most dreaded) Jewish holiday of the year. My most favorite because growing up in a "matriarchal" household in Queens, NY (where my maternal grandmother, two aunts, one uncle, a German shepherd, my mother, father, and brother all lived in the same 3-family home two blocks from the shul my You are the friends upon whom we depend. Membership grandmother founded) Passover was a unique holiday. The specially prepared foods, tasted only at this time of year were truly memorable and "worth the wait." Matzah brei, knaidlach, charosset and more dazzled my taste buds and to this day, evoke strong, warm memories. Watching my son and grandchildren develop similar memories makes me *"kvell"*!

It's also my most dreaded holiday; why? Invariably, my birthday was either on or right around Passover. Those same special food requirements also restricted greatly what I could consume. I love matzah (with butter or 'schmaltz' and salt) but it makes a lousy birthday cake! Back in the day, my mother would make a Passover sponge cake, dry as the cardboard box from which the mix came and then try to camouflage it with whipped cream and freshly sliced fruits. To this day, I don't eat sponge cake, whipped cream or most berries.

Nowadays, with the advent of kosher agri-conglomerates and fresh-flash-freezing, we really want for nothing! It's not an austere holiday anymore! Want a hot dog, taco, pizza, spaghetti or chocolate mousse? Just visit the neighbor- As always, thank you for your continued and generous suphood market and you'll find it all in the "Kosher l'Pesach" dry goods, fresh or frozen food departments waiting for your purchase.

Synagogues unfortunately aren't so lucky, and we can't run to the supermarket to fulfill our weekday, Shabbat or holiday shopping baskets. This time of year, cash on hand dwindles from our September high water mark, and we try to project our finances trough the end of our fiscal year (June 30th) so that we can continue to provide the same level of programs and services to which we've been accustomed. Some years it's more challenging than others but even under the best of circumstances, it takes a great deal of effort to stay within budget and also, as the Beatles' song says, "we get by with a little help from our friends!" This year is no different.





SALE OF CHAMETZ PROXY

During the Festival of Passover, we are commanded not to have any chametz in our possession, even if it is locked up and out of sight. In order to prevent a financial hardship from having to destroy or give away all our chametz before Passover starts, the practice arose for people to securely store their chametz before Pesach and arrange to sell it for the duration of the holiday.

We are happy to help you ensure that you are not in legal possession of any chametz during the Festival of Passover. <u>Please return the contract below to Rabbi Rubin by Wednesday, April 13, 2022, at 10:00 a.m.</u> Since this is a legal contract authorizing Rabbi Rubin to serve as your agent to conduct the sale of your chametz, it must be accompanied by a check in an appropriate amount made out to Rabbi Rubin's Discretionary Fund. Please allow one hour after the conclusion of Passover for sufficient time for Rabbi Rubin to conclude the repurchase transaction, at which time you may legally re-possess your chametz.

If you would like to perform a ceremony of ritual kinyan (acquisition) in person, Rabbi Rubin is available by appointment at other times to conclude an agreement of agency appointment.

YOM HASHOAH

On Yom HaShoah, also known as Holocaust Martyrs' and Heroes' Remembrance Day, is the 27th of Nisan. It will begin at sundown on Wednesday, April 27th, and conclude at sundown on Thursday, April 28th.

Jews around the world gather on Yom HaShoah to memorialize the six million Jews who were murdered in the Holocaust. In Israel, this solemn day begins with a ceremony at Yad Vashem in which six Holocaust survivors light six torches, representing the six million murdered Jews. The following morning, a two-minute-long siren is sounded throughout the country. During this time, people stop whatever they are doing, whether working, walking or even driving, and stand in silence. Cars and buses pull off to the side of the road so that people can get out of the vehicles in order to stand at attention. Afterward the siren, a second ceremony is held at Yad Vashem. Dignitaries and representatives of survivor groups lay six wreaths at the foot of the six torches. Additional memorial ceremonies are hosted at locations throughout Israel, including kibbutzim, schools, military bases and municipalities.

The Yad Vashem ceremonies are broadcast live. You can view them at <u>https://www.yadvashem.org/</u>. TBAY will send information about our annual Yom HaShoah commemoration via email later this spring.

LAG B'OMER 5782

Lag B'Omer, the 33rd day of counting the Omer, is on the 18th of Iyar (sundown May 18th – nightfall on May 19th). Lag B'Omer marks the death of Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, one of the most eminent disciples of Rabbi Akiva and widely considered to be the first teacher of Kabbalah. The Zohar calls his yahrzeit a *Yom Hillula*, the yahrzeit of a great Tzaddik (righteous person), which is commemorated through joy and celebration of the great light his wisdom shining into our world.

The first mention of Lag B'Omer celebrations are in 15th century writings. Lag B'Omer has become a minor holiday that serves as a break from the semi-mourning period of counting the Omer. People celebrate with weddings, bonfires, picnics, walks in the park, outdoor sports, and even haircuts. Some other customs include eating carob fruit and dyed eggs and giving children their first haircut. For many, the holiday celebrates the resilience of the Jewish spirit.

YOM HAZIKARON, ISRAELI MEMORIAL DAY AND YOM HAATZMA'UT ISRAELI INDEPENDENCE DAY

On Yom HaZikaron, Israel remembers and honors the soldiers who gave their lives in both the War of Independence and in protecting Israel since then, as well as the victims of terrorism. Yom HaZikaron in Israel is very different from Memorial Day here in the US. Instead of barbecues and parades, Israelis remember their fallen soldiers with silence and ceremonies. When the two-minute sirens are sounded, people stop what they are doing, even if they are driving, and stand in silence. This nation-wide pause is powerful. Remembering matters.

We celebrate Yom HaAtzma'ut the next day, recognizing that the reason we have an Independence Day is that people were willing to sacrifice their lives that Israel might live. The holiday begins a few minutes after sundown with a ceremonial raising of the flag on Mount Herzl in Jerusalem from half-mast to full mast. The ceremony usually involves performances, speeches, and the lighting of twelve torches symbolizing the Twelve Tribes of Israel. The following day is the day for parties, barbecues, concerts and celebrations. At the end of the day, the Israel Prize, Israel's highest award, is given in a special ceremony to 10-15 Israeli citizens or organizations who have displayed excellence in their fields or have contributed strongly to Israeli culture.

This year Yom HaZikaron begins at sundown on Tuesday, May 3rd, and concludes at sundown on Wednesday, May 4th. Yom HaAtzma'ut begins immediately after that, concluding at sundown on Thursday, May 5th.
